

Making multiplying disciples of Christ is one goal God has for all Christians. The Great Commission in Matthew 28.18-20 is for all believers.

- † Step one is to buy into God's vision for you as his image bearer, pursuing the Great Commandment and Great Commission.
- † Step two is to become more passionate and committed to God's way of life, less complacent about the positive commands of scripture.
- † Step three is to become more evangelistic in your life. Two keys to fruitful multiplication ministry are to share spiritual truth often and to partner with other believers to share with the same unchurched people.

Ways to be more evangelistic in life

1. Pray regularly for lost people in your life.

2. Be more aware of opportunities to have spiritual conversations in your everyday situations.

3. Be more intentional about making opportunities more likely.

- † Build relationships with neighbors and coworkers. Be social, be a good friend. Live out the character of Christ before them. Encourage them and pray for them. Take any opportunities to have spiritual conversations with them.
- † Talk with parents at GEMS, CSB, Good News Club. Talk with parents at school or sports events for children or grandchildren. See where that leads: maybe friendships and spiritual conversations.
- † Volunteer where non-believers might be, such as the Point, the PCCO [taking calls or helping clients], or doing good deeds like picking up trash in neighborhoods.

4. Ask people if you can share biblical truth, answer spiritual questions, or pray for needs.

- † Outgoing Approach: walk door to door; stand on street corner or in park.
- † Subtle Approach: talk with neighbors, coworkers, friends, or anyone you notice is hurting. We could develop a team to connect with those who ask for help at the church or the PCCO.
- † Shy Approach: connect on line with people.

5. Work together with other believers.

- † Pray for each other's lost friends and family in small group.
- † Invite non-believers to small group or church social events.
- † Build relationships with each other's unchurched friends and family.
